Passage: Luke 9:1–6

1. Read the Passage Aloud

Bible Study Using OIA

Observation — What does the text say?

- Who did Jesus call together in this passage?
- What two things did He give them before sending them out?
- What were they instructed to do on their mission?
- What specific resources did Jesus tell them not to take?
- How were they to handle hospitality when they entered a town?
- What were they told to do if people did not welcome them?
- What did the Twelve actually do in response?

Interpretation — What does the text mean?

- Why do you think Jesus gave them both power and authority?
- What does this reveal about the nature of the Kingdom of God?

- Why might Jesus have told them to "take nothing for the journey"?
- How does "shaking the dust off your feet" shape our understanding of rejection in ministry?
- What does this passage teach us about faith, dependence, and sacrifice in following Jesus?
- How does this connect to the message theme that the mission requires faith, not flash?

Application — How should we respond?

Personal

- Where in your life is Jesus inviting you to trust Him with "faith, not flash"?
- What's something you are carrying (fear, resource, excuse) that Jesus may be asking you to "travel light" and leave behind?
- How can you live more intentionally as one "sent" by Jesus this week?

Relational

- Who in your circle of influence needs encouragement, healing, or the good news of Jesus?
- How can you model Kingdom living in your workplace, neighborhood, or family?
- Who is God prompting you to serve in a simple but meaningful way (even if it seems as small as "navel oranges")?

Practical Step

- This week, take one intentional action to "make a difference" in someone's life—serve, encourage, pray with them, or share your faith story.
- Each morning, pray: "Lord, help me trust You today and use me to advance Your Kingdom."
